Restoration cost:	\$1.1M The restoration maintains the original characteristics of the building when it was constructed in 1967.

official Expo '67 guide:**

The construction of this pavilion caused a great deal of concern for its builders. There were no longer any designs of a Jamaican country shop. Architects had to conduct a lot of research and gather the information they needed to do an authentic reconstruction.

The Jamaican pavilion is a magnificent building where sturdy doloire-hewn (ax-shaped tool) beams overhang an welcoming space.

Current usage: Rented out by the SPJD for various activities (i.e. private receptions, weddings, corporate events, etc.)
